Making progress in class

As usual, we will give you a brief update about our students and the progress they are making in their educational institutes. We are extremely proud of all our students who have been working very hard this past academic year.

Progress of the 2nd year students

All the second year students in the programme are still continuing their classes and have taken their different examinations in their various institutes. Their skills classes are in progress and are planned to all finish by July this year. By that time, most second year students will also have taken their national exams for their college diplomas. Let's all think of them as they put all their effort and dedication towards this long-awaited moment! Good luck everyone!

The colleges all run on different academic calendars (two or three academic periods per year). The students at the Government Technical Institute (G.T.I) are in their second year and are awaiting their second semester examination results to move to the end of year. The students at Milton Margai College of Education and Technology (MMCET) are in the second semester of their second year and are in preparation for the NCTVA (National Council for Technical and Vocational and other Awards) Diploma Examination. The COBIT Students are currently in the third semester of their first academic year and are preparing to take their end of year examination in July 2018 to move on to the second year. Finally, the IAMTECH students are awaiting their first semester examination results and are currently in their second semester to also work towards the end of Diploma course NCTVA exams.

Progress of the 3rd year students

Two Software Engineering students at **BlueCrest College** have completed their Honours Diploma in Software Engineering and are currently doing their Web Development programme, which they will finish in October 2018.

The seven Network Engineering students at the **BlueCrest College** are now in their second semester of their final year, which they will also finish in October 2018.

The two Secretarial Studies students at **MMCET** are preparing for their end of course NCTVA Diploma examination. Last but not least, our Nursing student at **Redeemers School of Nursing**, is standing out in every way. She is currently in her second year and came in **second in her class out of 128 students and first in Math in the end of year exams!** What a remarkable job!

Patrick Barber, one of our I.T. students at BlueCrest, has started his internship with us at Schooling for Life as a Computer Skills intern-trainer, training the Computer Skills class for the second year students, together with Patrick Mambu, one of our other I.T. students.

As we all know, the transition from college to work place requires professional skills and in the modern day work place, the main tool for work is the computer. So that is why Schooling for Life provides her students with the necessary basic computer skills. From working with Word to Excel to the internet, and of course, how to

manage your email.

The purpose of the training is to provide basic computer knowledge and skills so that students will be able to work with a computer and basic programmes in both their private and professional lives. Of course, we have also developed a curriculum handbook for the students to take home and study from.

Our students are ready to tell the world about SfL

On the 10^{th} February 2018, upon request from our students, we had a training on outreach with both our 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} year students.

The purpose of the training was to train both batches of students on how to do outreach to promote Schooling for Life. On the 21st and 22nd of March this year, our students went to different (educational) institutes and communities in teams within Freetown during our new application process for the academic year 2018/2019, to reach out to young Sierra Leoneans who haven't heard about Schooling for Life. They told them what we do and how they have benefited from the programme to motivate them to apply.



The first TVET Job Fair in Sierra Leone



On the 19th April 2018, the TVET (Technical Vocational Education and Training) Coalition organised the first TVET Job Fair in Sierra Leone at the British Council, Freetown. Schooling for Life is a very active member of the TVET Coalition and was one of the organisers of this specific event.

The TVET Coalition is an alliance composed of government institutions, training providers, international donors, the private sector,

(international) NGOs and bi/multilateral organisations.

The TVET Job Fair was organised to bring together employers, potential employees and training providers. The event was a great success with over 600 job seekers attending between 10am and 5pm, and over 100 employers represented, amongst whom: UNDP, UNFPA, Africell, Cordaid, Sierra Rutile, Afrigas, the Chinese Embassy, Afriqia HR Solutions, the British Council, GIZ, Save the Children, and many more.

The job seekers had the opportunity to attend (free) workshops throughout the day that were all related to the job market. With a total space for 150 job seekers divided over 5 workshops, we couldn't even satisfy the requests.

As always, we encouraged all our students to attend the TVET Job Fair and to help out with preparations.

A group of Schooling for Life students did great jobs in supporting the Coalition by welcoming registered job seekers and handing out goodie bags to them at the entrance of the Job Fair. As an organising member, Schooling for Life also had a booth at the Job Fair, that was (wo)manned by our staff and students to explain to participants about the great work of Schooling for Life.



Capacity Training for staff and students

A one-day interactive staff capacity building training on how to create an enjoyable work environment was conducted for the staff on 14^{th} May 2018, facilitated by Mr. Pereira.

Subtopics were: How to properly plan work, prioritising tasks, and daring to ask your supervisor or colleague clarifying questions on tasks you don't understand. The facilitator of the training explained that using these methods helps reduce stress on staff



and creates a healthy work environment within the organisation.





On the 11th May 2018, the students also received a training on General Health, Stress Management and Healthy Living in a student's life. The training was very interactive with group activities on healthy lifestyles and dramas created by students on the causes of stress and how to overcome them.
